SYNOPSIS

Act I

The marriage day of Orphée and Euridice.

A joyous occasion needs celebrations and these are led (perhaps too boisterously) by her companions Daphné, Enone and Arethuze. Things quickly go awry as Euridice reveals she's been poisoned by a snake, with Orphée appearing just in time to witness her death.

Inconsolable without his lover, Orphée wants to take his own life but his father Apollon dissuades him. He suggests Orphée ventures into the underworld to convince its king to release Euridice through the power of his music.

Act I

Arriving in Hades, Orphée sees three souls condemned to eternal punishment – Ixion, bound to a perpetually spinning wheel; Tantalus, forever hungry and thirsty; and Titye, who is constantly devoured by vultures. With the tender accents of his voice he soothes their suffering. Pluton, the god of the underworld is shocked to find a mortal in his realm.

Orphée explains to Pluton that he has come for Euridice and, with the encouragement of Pluton's wife Proserpine, he recounts how Euridice perished and begs Pluton to return his beloved. Although initially refusing, with the charm of Orphée's beautiful song and a gentle reminder of how Pluton himself had abducted his wife, Pluton relents. Orphée may now lead Euridice up to the world of the living, but on one condition: that he doesn't turn around to look at her as they go. The spirits lament Orphée's departure.
